ADVANCE NOTICE: STUDY TRIP TO ITALY, MAY 2013

ITALY REVEALED: CULTURE, CUISINE, CHURCH, COUNTRYSIDE TWO "BACK TO BACK" TOURS IN ITALY: MAY 11–MAY 23, 2013, OR MAY 20–JUNE 1, 2013.

Visit Italy with University of Texas Professor of the Year SEAN THERIAULT, who teaches a university course on the Catholic Church, and his former student FLAMINIA CHAPMAN, now a top tour guide in Italy.

Sean has visited Italy many times and has excellent contacts with Vatican officials. He can take us behind the scenes to visit some of Italy's most treasured sites and to understand the politics of the Catholic Church and the Vatican's relationships with the United States. A highlight of our four days of sightseeing in Rome will be a private visit for our group to the Vatican Museum and the Sistine Chapel after closing hours.

Flaminia will take us to stay at her family villa in Umbria and into the countryside to meet the people, tour wonderful small towns, and have an up-close-and-personal look at the art and architecture, the wine, the cuisine, and the countryside.

Each group of 14 will have a week in Umbria, and the two groups will overlap in Rome.

Tentative price: \$5,806 per person (single supplement \$800) not including airfare, some meals, alcoholic beverages other than wine at dinner, gratuities, individual purchases, or trip insurance.

A limited number of single rooms will be available.

Note: Some parts of the tour will require extensive walking on rough or uneven terrain.

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MATISSE: IN SEARCH OF TRUE PAINTING

This December, The Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York, will present Matisse, In Search of True Painting, an exhibition of 50 paintings. The Houston Seminar has invited **Rebecca Rabinow**, the Met's co-curator of the exhibit, to come to Houston in September to give our audience a sneak preview of the exhibit.

Matisse continually strove to capture the essence of his subjects and to this end, repeated imagery sometimes as pairs, trios, or series. While this approach is not unique, Matisse's need to work from one painting to the next is striking and reveals him to be an artist who continually questioned himself and his methods in order to, as he put it, "push further and deeper into true painting." The exhibition, currently on view at the Centre Georges Pompidou, Paris, through June 18, will be displayed at the Statens Museum for Kunst in Copenhagen from July 14 to October 28 before traveling to New York.

REBECCA RABINOW, a curator in the Department of Modern and Contemporary Art, joined the staff of the Metropolitan Museum of Art in 1990. Since that time, she has helped organize seventeen special exhibitions at the museum and assisted with the reinstallation of the Nineteenth and Early Twentieth-Century European Paintings and Sculpture Galleries (2007). She is a cocurator of the award-winning exhibition, The Steins Collect: Matisse, Picasso, and the Parisian Avant-Garde, on view at the Metropolitan Museum through June 3. She holds a PhD from the Institute of Fine Arts, New York University, and did her undergraduate work at Smith College. She is a co-author of several exhibition catalogues including *Ambroise Vollard, Patron of the Avant-Garde* and *The Steins Collect*.

As many of you know, Richard Murray has taken us through this hurly burly Republican primary season. In September, he resumes his always fascinating and stimulating examination of American presidential politics. By that time the parties will have selected their nominees, and we will be down to the final decision. From what has occurred in the spring of 2012, it appears that the fall will offer us a vibrant and heated debate on where the American people want to go.

RICHARD MURRAY is just the person to sort out and make sense of the complicated issues and events before us. His judgments always seem to be just on the mark, and his predictions have been stunningly accurate. The insight he brings to the American landscape is a must for this political year.

Professor Murray is the Bob Lanier Professor of Urban Public Policy and director of surveying for the Center for Public Policy at the University of Houston, where an endowed scholarship in his name was established.

THE ENLIGHTENED LISTENER: AT HOME WITH MUSIC

In three informal evenings, pianist CLIVE SWANSBOURNE will play and discuss music by some of the great early Romantic composers. He will consider stylistic, formal, and technical aspects of the music, sometimes concentrating on a single composition in detail.

SEPTEMBER 24 Schubert: Classical Romantic

Schubert's music spans the Classical and Romantic styles and includes elements of both. There is ongoing debate even now about which style dominates and whether to categorize Schubert's music as either Classical or Romantic. Although such categorization is unnecessary, this line of inquiry does lead us to investigate more deeply the vast range and variety of his music, how he transformed his Classical influences, and how he paved the way for the new generation of composers.

OCTOBER 15

Schumann: Young Revolutionary

Schumann's youthful compositions are among his most original and are some of the finest examples of early Romanticism. They disobey all the "rules" of proportion, balance, and structure that guided the Classical masters, and yet they succeed through the power of Schumann's uniquely vivid imagination and style.

NOVEMBER 12

Brahms: Reluctant Romantic

Brahms was an admirer of Schumann but sought to model his music on that of the Classical masters, especially Haydn and Beethoven. His early piano sonatas and variations are examples of these influences. However, his embrace of the Romantic ideal in his piano music is most evident in his later, more personal, short pieces, which we will enjoy in this session.

CLIVE SWANSBOURNE studied at the Royal College of Music in London and received his doctorate from the Yale School of Music. He has won prizes in international competitions and performed with orchestras and at music festivals in Europe, Canada, and the U.S. In Houston he has performed the complete Beethoven piano sonata cycle and the piano works of Schubert to packed houses at the Rothko Chapel. He and cellist Barrett Sills founded the Village Chamber Players, which recently completed its inaugural season of Village Concerts.

Please enter Fondren Library via the east entrance, opening off the Academic Quadrangle. A picture i.d. is required to enter the library. Rice students, faculty, and staff admitted to lectures and tour free of charge with a Rice University i.d. card.

Please join the Houston Seminar to celebrate Rice University's centennial and wish it a happy 100th birthday. We will hear four stimulating lectures and enjoy a campus tour. On these five occasions, well-known historians who know the university intimately will discuss its visionary leaders, its origins and founding, the 100 years during which it has educated thousands of students, and its beautiful campus and well-designed, carefully sited buildings and art.

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 3: *KATE S. KIRKLAND* will speak on Captain James A. Baker, the first chairman of the Rice board of trustees and the so-called savior of Rice Institute. She will discuss Baker's influence on the institute's origins, founding, and early years. Ms. Kirkland will also touch on Captain Baker's role among the leaders of Houston, his career as businessman, banker, and lawyer, and their effects on Rice. She is the author of *Captain James A. Baker of Houston, 1857–1941* (Texas A&M University Press, 2012), published in conjunction with the university's centennial, and *The Hogg Family and Houston: Philanthropy and the Civic Ideal* (University of Texas Press, 2009). Ms. Kirkland holds a Ph.D. in history from Rice.

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 18: *JOHN B. BOLES* will discuss Edgar Odell Lovett, the first president of Rice Institute, his vision for the institute, and his presidency, 1908–1946. Mr. Boles is the William Pettus Hobby Professor of American History at Rice, editor of the *Journal of Southern History*, and the author of *University Builder: Edgar Odell Lovett and the Founding of the Rice Institute* (Louisiana State University Press, 2007; paperback, updated edition, 2012), published in conjunction with the university's centennial.

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 24: MELISSA F. KEAN will delve into the more recent history of Rice and the many changes between the end of World War II and the present. During the 1960s the Rice charter was amended, which resulted in racial desegregation, charging tuition for the first time, and changing the name from Institute to University. Ms. Kean will also discuss more recent developments in governance, administration, and student life. She is Rice's Centennial Historian and the author of Desegregating Private Higher Education in the South: Duke, Emory, Rice, Tulane, and Vanderbilt (Louisiana State University Press, 2008). Ms. Kean holds a Ph.D. in history from Rice.

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 31: STEPHEN FOX will present an illustrated architectural history of the Rice campus. He is the author of *Rice University: An Architectural Tour* (Princeton Architectural Press, 2001), fellow of the Anchorage Foundation of Texas, and lecturer in Rice's School of Architecture.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 3: STEPHEN FOX will lead an intensive, fast-paced, two-hour walking tour of the Rice University campus.

A Renaissance is underway at Rice with several new and exciting installations having been inaugurated in its ambitious Public Art Program. We will take an intimate view of several of the recent specially commissioned works; highlights include the iconic and groundbreaking pyramid shaped James Turrell *Skyspace*, a solar powered rotating ceiling installation made from recycled materials by Aurora Robson, the lyrical and contemplative *Mirror*, by Jaume Plensa, and the engaging and majestic bronze by Bruce Wolfe of Rice's founding president Edgar Odell Lovett , which marks the University's cenntennial. The tour will focus on projects in the central quad and will conclude with beverages, light refreshments, and casual discussion in the landmark Brochstein Pavillion.

Please join our tour leaders, *MOLLY HUBBARD*, Rice University Art Director, and Rice art committee member, *JUDY NYQUIST*, who will share their inside knowledge about the exciting program, its goals and future.
