

History of Coffee and Coffeehouses: 1500-1800 🗷

This two-part course traces the rise and dissemination of coffee in the period between 1500 and 1800 CE. We will explore the architecture, social atmosphere, and culture of coffeehouses from a cross-cultural perspective.



Coffee, a plant native to the highlands of Ethiopia, was first consumed as a hot beverage in Yemen during the fourteenth or fifteenth century. In the sixteenth century, the new drink spread beyond the Arabian Peninsula.

Coffeehouses then proliferated in the eastern Mediterranean region, Ottoman Turkey, and Safavid Iran. In the second half of the seventeenth century, coffee and coffeehouses were introduced to Europe.

In the first lecture **Farshid Emami** will take us to the Ottoman and Safavid lands, focusing on the cities of Aleppo, Istanbul, and Isfahan. The second lecture explores the early European coffeehouses of Venice, Paris, and London.

Farshid Emami is an associate professor of art history at Rice University where he specializes in art and architecture of the Islamic world with a focus on the early modern period and particularly Safavid Iran. Trained as an architect and urban designer, Professor Emami completed his Ph.D. in history of art and architecture at Harvard University.

Innovative Houston: Visits to The Ion and Greentown Labs

Travelers on Houston's Main Street have watched the rapid transformation of the former Sears building and Fiesta market into The Ion and Greentown Labs Houston. Join us to hear **Ryan LeVasseur**, **Jan Odegard**, and **Emily Reichert** reveal the activity inside these repurposed buildings as well as plans for future development of the Ion District, a joint initiative between Rice University and the City of Houston. The 16-acre mixed-use development is anchored by The Ion, a 266,000-square-foot building envisioned as a nucleus for innovation in Houston. The space fosters a community and culture where entrepreneurs and corporations come together to solve some of the world's greatest problems. Within a year of opening, The Ion has attracted several tenants, including four restaurants.

Massachusetts-based Greentown Labs opened its first satellite location here to accelerate Houston's evolution into a clean energy capital by supporting climate tech startups. The 40,000-square-foot incubator offers prototyping lab, office, and community space for up to 50 startup companies.

Ryan LeVasseur is the Managing Director of Direct Real Estate for Rice Management Company, Rice University's investment arm, and is responsible for investments in strategic development opportunities in Houston. Mr. LeVasseur previously spent five years in Hines's New York development office where he was a managing director.

Jan Odegard is the Executive Director at The Ion. Prior to joining The Ion, Mr. Odegard served as the Executive Director of the Ken Kennedy Institute at Rice University for 17 years, where he focused on building strategic partnerships to serve as catalysts for research, education, and external engagements in data and computing. He also served as the Associate Vice President for Research Computing at Rice for four years.

Emily Reichert is the CEO of Greentown Labs, the largest climate tech startup incubator in North America. As the organization's first employee in 2013, she spearheaded the rapid growth of Greentown Labs into a global center for clean technology innovation.



Tour the vibrant and beautiful studio of Houston artist **Dixie Friend Gay**, a nationally acclaimed artist with a prolific career that spans more than three decades. The remarkable breadth of her artistic production encompasses public art, sculpture, painting, and drawing. She is best known for her public art commissions, including those at George Bush Intercontinental Airport, the Port of Miami, Indianapolis International Airport, Sam Houston State University, and Texas A&M Galveston. From intimate paintings to large-scale architectural projects, Friend Gay's work is fueled by an awareness of the natural world and its ability to inspire altered states.

Friend Gay's work has been recognized by Americans for the Arts' "Public Art Network Year in Review". She has received multiple Craftsmanship Awards and was recognized as Texas Artist of the Year in 2003 by the Texas Commission for the Arts. Her work can be found in the collections of the Federal Reserve Bank in Houston, Rice University, the Huntington Museum of Art in West Virginia, and the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston, among many others.

See you in the Metaverse: A Primer on Crypto & NFTs 2

The worlds of finance and banking are changing rapidly. Terms like De-Fi, cryptocurrency, blockchain, Ethereum and Bitcoin are dominating our news feeds. This three-part lecture series begins with two talks by Manolo Sanchez as he demystifies the language of digital assets, explores their potential impact on financial services, studies the main types of crypto assets (Bitcoin, Ethereum, tokens, stablecoins, and privacy coins) and how they are issued and held (wallets, exchanges, initial coin offerings, airdrops). In the last part of the series, Jeff Davis will dive into the world of non-fungible tokens, exploring what they are, how they are made, and how they are rocking the art world with prices in the hundreds of millions.

Manolo Sanchez is an adjunct professor in management at Rice University's Jones School of Business where he teaches disruption in financial services with a focus on cryptocurrencies and blockchain. Mr. Sanchez is the former CEO of BBVA Compass. He has earned degrees from Yale University, the London School of Economics, and the College of Europe in Belgium.

Jeff Davis holds an M.F.A. in painting and drawing from the School of the Art Institute of Chicago. Mr. Davis is an artist, author, and founder of Davis Editions, a contemporary print publisher and online sales platform. He is the Chief Creative Officer of Art Blocks Inc., a platform focused on genuinely programmable, on-demand generative content that is stored immutably on the Ethereum blockchain.



The Midterm Elections: Our Experts Speak

Polarization. Gridlock. Inflation. Supply-chain issues. Tensions with Russia. Redistricting and gerrymandering. Pandemic. These and other weighty issues will shape the races between Republicans and Democrats during the 2022 midterm elections. Join us to hear longtime Seminar political analysts **Sean Theriault** and **Richard Murray** offer their insights before and after the midterms.

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 27: Professor Theriault reminds us that although the president's party normally loses seats in the midterms, these times are anything but normal. Will the political picture once again take on new colors, or even an entirely different look? What are the key races? What might we expect?


THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 17: Professor Murray will focus on several key questions: What happened in the U.S. House? Did Republicans regain the majority, or did the Democrats' slim margin hold up? What happened in the Senate? What happened in Texas? And what do the 2022 midterms tell us about what to expect in the 2024 cycle?

Sean Theriault, a Distinguished Teaching Professor in the department of government at the University of Texas at Austin, has received numerous teaching awards, including Professor of the Year, and is the author of several books on congressional decision-making.

Richard Murray consulted in more than 200 political campaigns in the late twentieth century and has worked in six Texas redistricting cycles from 1971 to the present. He taught political science at the University of Houston from 1966 until his retirement in 2020 and remains a Senior Research Associate at the University's Hobby Center for Public Policy.


Houston delights with its urban gardens and nature sanctuaries. Join the Houston Seminar as we explore the Houston Audubon Raptor and Education Center and the Houston Botanic Garden, both located along Sims Bayou in historic Park Place.

We begin our day at the Houston Audubon Raptor and Education Center, a picturesque 1.1-acre sanctuary where the Education Director **Mary Anne Weber** will give us a behind-the-scenes tour of the sanctuary and some up-close encounters with hawks and owls.

We continue to the nearby Houston Botanic Garden for a private tour of the world-class, 132-acre garden and its wide variety of plant life and ecosystems led by the Garden's President **Claudia Gee Vassar**. We will learn why having a botanic garden is important to our community and hear directly from the experts about the diverse horticulture on display, including the global collection garden, the culinary garden which features edible and medicinal plants, the coastal prairie, and stormwater wetlands.

A boxed lunch will be provided, and guests are welcome to linger and enjoy the garden afterwards.

Stephen Klineberg and the Prophetic City P

In this evening discussion, **Stephen Klineberg** will give us the benefit of his accumulated wisdom and perspective about Houston before he moves away from the city he has studied with insight and acuity for the past 40 years.

In the annual "Kinder Houston Area Survey", conducted since 1982, Professor Klineberg has tracked the shifts in economic outlooks, demographic patterns, life experiences, attitudes, and beliefs among successive representative samples of Harris County residents. His 2020 book Prophetic City: Houston on the Cusp of a Changing America goes even deeper, fleshing out the annual survey numbers with anecdotes about the people who have made Houston what it is today and the motivations behind the numbers. Professor Klineberg's stories are riveting, and his insights provide a key to a real understanding of Houston. He helps us to interpret the past, appreciate the present, and anticipate the future, not only for Houston but for the rest of the country as well.

Stephen Klineberg is Professor Emeritus of Sociology at Rice University, founding director of the Kinder Institute for Urban Research, and is the recipient of twelve major teaching awards at Rice University. Klineberg is a graduate of Haverford College, with an M.A. from the University of Paris and a Ph.D. from Harvard University.
